

2010

The 2010 Annual Report of the 16th Judicial Circuit continues to reflect that change is one of the true constants in the operation of the Court. This past year, change was reflected in everything from the composition of the Court, to the manner in which cases are processed and records are stored and retrieved. However, even with the significant shifts reflected in the statistical analysis and narrative statements contained in the report, other even more significant changes, changes that go beyond the numbers, also occurred.

Composition of the Bench

One of the Court's Associate Circuit Judges retired mid-year and two of its Circuit Judges retired at yearend. Not only is this degree of turnover in the Court's bench unusual, but it is expected that the earliest the two vacant circuit divisions will be filled is June 2011. While this will allow the state to recognize a significant amount of salary savings in tight budgetary times, the impact on the Court of having, in effect, one fewer judicial officer for a full year is significant.

Electronic Records

Beginning in 2009 and continuing in 2010, the Court has been moving more fully into the electronic age by beginning to scan certain documents as they are received and in some instances to create electronic, rather than paper, versions of the records it produces. These changes are being made both in anticipation of the electronic filing project, which is being piloted in the appellate courts and in St. Charles County in 2011, being expanded to other trial courts in the state as well as in response to a pending crisis in the Court's ability to continue to store the number of physical records it either receives or creates.

Case Filings

The Court has also seen changes in the cases being filed. One significant area of change has been in the number of traffic filings, which initially declined when the Court began participating in the statewide Fine Collection Center, and declined even further when Jackson County began to file these cases with its new municipal court rather than with the Circuit Court. A further decline in driving while revoked cases is anticipated in 2011 as the result of a number of these cases also being filed in the Jackson County Municipal Court. Another significant change in the cases filed with the Court is in the number of domestic relations cases that are filed pro se. In cases involving dissolutions both with and without children, pro se filings are increasing. Employment discrimination cases filed with the Court also continue to rise.

Improvement in Meeting Time Standards

Despite the changes noted above and, more critically, the reductions in resources noted below, in 2010, the Court saw improvement in the number of cases disposed within the statewide time standards for both civil and criminal cases. In the civil arena, the percentage of cases disposed within the time standards for 2010 either matched or exceeded the percentage disposed during the preceding five years across all case types (circuit civil, associate civil and domestic relations). In the criminal arena, the percentage of felony cases disposed within the time standards reached a five year high in 2010, while the percentage of misdemeanor cases disposed within the time standards was two percentage points higher than in the preceding year (2009) and only one percentage point lower than in the three years preceding 2009. These improvements in meeting the time standards occurred despite the fact that the Court had its lowest level of jury-tried cases in that same five-year period.



At the Family Court, the number of youths admitted to detention continued to decline, in large part due to the Juvenile Detention Alternatives Initiative (JDAI) implemented by the Court in 2006, allowing the Court to stay within its detention facility capacity despite a reduction in that capacity.

The continuing reduction in the Court's resources, whether in beds available for juvenile detention or in staffing levels throughout the Court, is another challenge faced by the Court. As a result of the Reduction in Force (RIF) implemented by the Court in 2009 with respect to positions funded by the county, the loss of two state funded positions in 2009, and state hiring delays and hiring freezes in place for much of both 2009 and 2010, as calendar year 2010 came to a close, the Court was operating with significantly fewer employees than it had been at the start of calendar year 2009.

In an effort to continue to operate as effectively as possible despite reductions in resources, the Court undertook a significant computer training effort in 2010, which is continuing in 2011. Other changes that continue into 2011 include determining how to lessen our need for records' storage at the archives (including the increased use of scanning and digitization of records), continuing with various courthouse renovations and a possible move of the Jury Assembly Room to the ground floor of the Kansas City Courthouse.

My thanks to the Court's excellent Department Directors who assisted in the collection of the material for this report and my special thanks to the Court's Management Analyst, Mary Cullom, who prepares this data every year for publication.

From 2009 to 2010, the Court saw the following changes in Civil Records:

- Circuit Civil filings decreased by 2%. The greatest percentage of filings were vehicular personal injury cases (13%) and breach of contract cases (12%).
- Employment discrimination filings continue to rise from less than 1% of all circuit civil cases filed in 2005 to 5% in 2010. The number of employment discrimination cases filed in 2010 increased by 7% over 2009 filings.
- Associate filings decreased by 1% overall from 2009, a decline of 3% in Kansas City, but an increase of 3% in Independence.
- 31% of all Associate Civil filings were suits on account, 23% for breach of contract and 16% for rent and possession.
- Dispositions of Associate Civil cases declined 4%, but pending caseloads on December 31, 2010 remained the same as a year earlier.
- Domestic Relations filings rose by 3%, as did the dispositions by 7% in 2010 with a corresponding 7% decline in pending cases at the end of 2010.
- In 2010, 41% of dissolutions without children and 27% of dissolutions with children were filed pro se.
- There was a 3% decrease in Domestic Violence filings in 2010, the greatest decrease being in motions to modify.

More Steps Toward Paperless Case Files and Electronic Filing


During the 2010 calendar year, the Civil Records continued scanning and attaching filed documents to JIS. Major pleadings in Circuit Civil and Domestic cases are now scanned and attached at filing.


In Independence, a scanned judgment in JIS is used to process the Execution/Garnishment requests. At the time of a first request, if the judgment has not been scanned and attached in JIS, the file is pulled and the judgment scanned. Any subsequent execution request uses the scanned judgment. The execution/garnishment interrogatories are also scanned. The documents are forwarded for service. All the documents used in this process are filed in a box by their date for easy access. This method has proved to be highly efficient. Due to the hiring freeze and shortage of staff, it is not yet feasible to extend the processing to Kansas City.


Electronic Banking


With regard to banking, checks received are now scanned, and the scanned check file sent to the bank for deposit. The only item being physically deposited is cash. After 30 days, the scanned checks are shredded. If there are any problems with a check, the image is available for reference.


















Domestic Violence Filings by Category








Time Standards

The statewide time standards for circuit civil cases are that 95% be disposed within 30 months. For associate civil and domestic relations cases, the standard is for 95% disposed within 12 months and 14 months, respectively. The larger chart below illustrates the percentage of the 16th Circuit's cases meeting these standards. The smaller table to the right shows more detail on the age of cases at disposition.

The court saw the following changes in criminal caseloads from 2009 to 2010:

- 60% of all felony filings in 2010 were in Kansas City, 40% in Independence.
- Although overall felony filings remained unchanged from 2009, felony filings decreased 11% in Kansas City, and increased 22% in Independence.
- Of the felony cases initially filed in 2010, 24% were drug related, 16% were alcohol related, and 9% were burglary offenses.
- The clearance rate (the number of dispositions/the number of filings) for felonies was 94%, and felony inventories rose 2%.
- Misdemeanor filings decreased 40% and traffic case filings fell 47%, reflecting the Jackson County Sheriff's preference for ticketing under local ordinance and the diversion of filings to the Jackson County Municipal Court.
- Of all new misdemeanor filings, 44% were for driving while license is revoked or suspended, 13% involved motor vehicle equipment, and 13% were for driving under the influence.
- Filings of municipal appeals increased 13%.
- Drug related case filings decreased by 36%, and drug court filings decreased by 25%.

Document Scanning

For new criminal case filings in 2010, the charging and disposition documents were scanned and attached in JIS to docket entries. Older criminal cases were 'back scanned' when time and resources permitted. Beginning in 2011, all new case filings have all documents with corresponding JIS docket entries scanned and attached.

Initiation and Processing of Criminal Cases Assigned to Drug Court

In October, 2010, Criminal Records began initiating and processing criminal cases assigned to Drug Court in a manner consistent with other criminal cases. Drug Court previously initiated and processed the criminal case associated with the drug treatment case.

Adjustments to Compensate for Decreased Staff

Work flow adjustments and re-alignment of job duties have been required to compensate for additional work duties and vacant positions (5) created by the State hiring freeze.


Traffic Numbers


Traffic ticket filings have drastically fallen. Two major factors account for the decline, use of the Fine Collection Center and commencement of the Jackson County Municipal Court. On August 1, 2005, the Court started using the Fine Collection Center to process certain tickets. Only tickets not paid within the allowed time are filed with the Court. This greatly decreased traffic filings. Then on June 1, 2008, the Jackson County Municipal Court went live and ordinance violations are now filed in that Court. The Jackson County Sheriff is writing more tickets as local ordinance charges that are heard in the Jackson County Municipal Court rather than as State charges in our Court.

Many misdemeanor traffic tickets (DWI, DWR, etc) are now being filed in the Jackson County Municipal Court, resulting in a 45% decrease in misdemeanor filings in Independence.

Filings in Eastern Jackson County

Criminal filings have steadily increased in Eastern Jackson County. As vacancies and workloads continue to shift, staffing assessments and workflow are adjusted as needed between the Kansas City and Independence locations.








Time Standards

Probate

2010 At a Glance

The court saw the following changes in probate cases from 2009 to 2010:

- Filings of guardianships for minors rose 1%, but overall fillings decreased by 6%.
- Dispositions increased by 24% as old cases not correctly disposed at conversion to JIS were cleaned up.
- With regard to involuntary detentions, there were 10% fewer filings but 116% more dispositions in 2010 than in 2009.
- There were 4 jury trials held, 2 involving sexually violent predators,
 1 on a guardianship and 1 civil commitment.
- There were 1% fewer cases pending at the end of 2010.



Behind the Numbers

- In 2009 probate commenced scanning and linking all documents filed. In 2010, probate began scanning closed records as well.
- Renovations of the Probate Department began in August in the New Estates area. A new kitchen and new offices for the auditors were constructed. The second phase in 2011 includes construction of a new courtroom for use by the Commissioners. These renovations have required the temporary movement of functions and people.
- The Probate Department undertook a project to bar code all closed files currently housed at the Records Center, making the files easier to access and retrieve.
- Old cases converted to JIS and not initially disposed correctly in JIS were reviewed and properly disposed in cleanup project.

Family Cour

Family Court saw the following changes in caseloads from 2009 to 2010:

- Referrals for abuse and neglect declined 1%. Formal filings for abuse and neglect rose 3% over 2009 and have increased 47% since 2006.
- Status offense referrals rose by 6%, but formal filings fell 24%.
- Delinquency referrals increased 2%, but formal filings fell 17%. Felony offenses were 38% of all delinquency referrals. 17% of all delinquency filings were for violent offenses.
- Certifications filed rose 28%.
- Between 2001 and 2010 the number of youth admitted to detention has declined 64%.
- Cases served by mediation rose 10% and actual visits or exchanges rose 13%



The court saw the following changes in jury trials from 2009 to 2010:


- There was a 17% decrease in the number of cases tried by juries, 9% fewer civil trials and 26% fewer criminal.
- The number of jurors available remained unchanged, but 25% more jurors were impaneled and sent to Independence Divisions.
- There was a significant increase in Independence jury trials over 2009, 28% rise in civil cases, 13% rise in criminal jury trials, and an overall increase of 23%.
- The number of people reporting and qualified in relation to those summoned remained virtually unchanged in 2010, as did the number of jurors sworn in relation to those qualified.
- Employment discrimination cases have replaced contract cases as the second most jury tried civil case type, constituting 15% of all civil jury trials.




Compared to 2009, the following changes in service of process and writs were seen in 2010:

- The number of summons received declined 6%.
- The number of prejudgment process successfully served as a percentage of the number received for service decreased by 1%
- Post-judgment papers received fell 4% with an 1% fall in levies and garnishments and 40% fall in attachments and replevins.
- Of post-judgment writs, only ex parte orders served rose (17%).







