



CIVIL RECORDS

Working with the Fiscal Office, the Criminal Records Department, and the Probate Department, the Civil Records Department spent a large part of 2016 in planning and preparing for the transition of accounting functions to a centralized accounting unit under the supervision of the Fiscal Office. These accounting functions are now performed in the different offices of the Records Departments. In November, the new centralized unit began with the transfer of the Financial Task Force to the Fiscal Office.

In Independence, in 2015, Circuit Case Initiation Unit and the Associate Case Initiation Unit were combined into one Case Initiation Unit. In 2016, the Kansas City Office made the same change for increased efficiency.

In Kansas City, the Case Action Unit was re-named Post-Filing to make unit names consistent in both locations of the Department.

A Department Analyst position was created and filled. The new position is to support the Department in better tracking and processing case flow, as well as to improve accuracy.


Comparing 2016 to 2015

- Circuit Civil (CC) filings have increased
 6%.
- More CC cases are being filed than are being disposed leading to a clearance rate of 98% for 2016 compared to 104% for 2015 and leading to a 3% increase in CC cases pending at the end of 2016.
- ♦ 95% of CC cases pending on 12/31/2016 are within the State's time standard of 900 days, an improvement over 94% on 12/31/2015.
- 95% of CC dispositions continue to fall within the State time standards, the same as in 2015.
- Personal Injury—Vehicular (17.5%) continues to be the greatest percentage of CC filings followed by Other Personal Injury (8.9%) and Breach of Contract (8.7%).
- Associate Circuit Civil (ACC) filings and dispositions have each increased 12%.
- ACC clearance rate for 2016 was unchanged from 2015 at 99%.
- The number of pending ACC cases on 12/31/2016 increased 2%; 98% of those pending cases were within the State time standard as compared to 97% of the cases pending on 12/31/2015.

As in 2015, ACC filings for rent and possession (22.3%), for breach of contract (20.9%) and for suits on account (20.7%) were the three highest filings in 2016.

Comparing 2016 to 2012:

- CC filings have increased 1%; dispositions decreased 1%.
- The CC clearance rate and the number of cases disposed within the State time standards were both 99% in 2012 compared to 98% and 97%, respectively, in 2016.
- Dispositions by jury trials in CC cases have decreased 7% while bench trials have increased 137%.
- ◊ ACC filings have decreased 12%; disposition decreased 7%.
- Clearance rates for ACC cases are 1% less, but the percentage of cases disposed within the State time standard has increased 1%.
- The age of pending ACC cases falling within the State time standard on 12/31/2016 is 2% more than those pending on 12/31/2012.






Time standards for Circuit Civil cases are the disposition of 95% within 30 months. For Associate Circuit Civil cases, the standard is the disposition of 95% within 12 months. The chart above shows the % disposed with these time standards for the calendar years. Each year met or exceeded the time standards for both Circuit Civil and Associate.



The chart above shows the percentage of pending cases on December 31 of each calendar year that are within the time standards. 95% of the Circuit Civil cases pending on 12/31/2016 had been filed for less than 30 months where 98% of the Associate Circuit Civil cases pending on that date had been filed for less than 12 months.

Clearance rates show the ratio of dispositions to filings. A clearance rate of 100% is obtained when the number of dispositions in the year equals the number of cases filed in that year. In 2016, more Circuit Civil cases and more Associate Circuit Civil cases were filed than were disposed.

Note: The Court had multiple judicial vacancies in 2012 and in 2013 which account for lower clearance rates in those years.


Comparing 2016 to 2015:

- Domestic Relations (DR) filings increased 3%, but dispositions decreased 6%.
- Dispositions of DR cases by bench trial increased 57%.
- There were 6% fewer DR cases pending on 12/31/2016 than on 12/31/2015.
- Filings for Domestic Violence (DV) cases decreased 1%, while dispositions decreased 5%.
- There were full orders of protection issued in 24% more of the DV cases.
- ♦ There were 41% more DV cases pending on 12/31/2016 than a year earlier.
- 93% of the combined DR and DV cases were disposed within the State time standard,
- 10% more of the combined DR and DV cases pending on 12/31/2016 were within the State time standard than those pending on 12/31/2015.
- The clearance rate for DR and DV cases was 100% compared to 107% in 2015.

Comparing 2016 to 2012:

- DR filings decreased by 11%, dispositions by 16%.
- Pro se filings in dissolutions without children have risen from 51% in 2012 to 70% in 2016 compared to all dissolutions without children filed.
- Pro se filings in dissolutions with children have risen from 28% in 2012 to 33% in 2016.
- There was an increase of 10% in the number of DR cases disposed by bench trial.
- ◊ There were 26% fewer DR cases pending on 12/31/2016 than on 12/31/2012.
- Filings for DV cases decreased 1%, disposition decreased 4%.
- There was a increase of 61% in the number of orders of full protection granted in DV cases.
- There were 23% more DV cases pending on 12/31/2016.
- The percentage of DR and DV cases pending on 12/31/2016 that were within the State time standard was 89% compared to 73% in 2012.




PERFORMANCE MEASURES FOR DOMESTIC RELATIONS AND DOMESTIC VIOLENCE CASES

CRIMINAL RECORDS

In 2016, there was a renovation of the Kansas City Office of Criminal Records. At the same time, a plan was developed for the transition of staff at both offices to a new centralized financial unit for the Court, and procedures were updated and personnel trained to implement that transition plan. Cases arising from the Grandview area were moved from the Independence Office to Kansas City. Given a decrease in staffing, the Kansas City personnel in Case Initiation and Financial were consolidated into one unit.

Extradition cases transitioned from being filed in folders to electronic files and initiated into JIS.

During the course of 2016, the Grandview and Raytown Police Departments began using video conferencing for initial appearances of defendants arrested by those Departments.

After much testing, arrest warrants and recalls are now being electronically sent through REJIS to all law enforcement agencies except for the Independence Police Department and the Missouri Highway Patrol which do not use REJIS. Arrest warrant returns are likewise transmitted through REJIS to Criminal Records. This has expedited the transmission of warrants and returns and eliminated paper documents.

Additionally, monthly audit procedures of the transmissions to and from REJIS have been instituted to ensure that served and recalled warrants are closed in the Systems.



Comparing 2016 to 2015:


- Felony filings increased 10%.
- Dispositions in felony cases increased 8%, jury trials increased 2%, but bench trials decreased 26%.
- The clearance rate for Circuit Felony cases was 89% compared to 104% in 2015, and 87% of pending cases on 12/31/2016 were within 420 days of filing, unchanged from 12/31/2015. Also unchanged, the 87% of disposed cases meeting time standards in 2016.
- Misdemeanor filings increased 4%.
- Misdemeanor dispositions decreased 14%.
- There was a 19% increase in bench trials for misdemeanor cases.
- Search warrant filings increased 4%.

Comparing 2016 to 2012:

- ◊ Felony filings increased 4%.
- Dispositions in felony cases decreased 5%, with jury trials increasing 70% and bench trials decreasing 7%.
- The clearance rate for Circuit Felony cases was 89% compared to 93% in 2012, and 17% more pending cases on 12/31/2016 were within 420 days of filing than on 12/31/2012. However, the percentage of disposed cases meeting time standards decreased to 87% from 98% in 2012.
- Misdemeanor filings increased 5%.
- Misdemeanor dispositions decreased 12%.
- There was an 68% increase in bench trials in misdemeanor cases in 2016.
- Search warrant filings increased 2%.





The Associate Criminal category includes misdemeanors and felonies from initial filing until bindover or grand jury indictment. According to Missouri Time Standards, 95% of cases within Associate Criminal should be disposed within 240 days of filing.




- Traffic filings increased 7%, and traffic dispositions decreased 10%.
- Municipal appeals filings decreased 6%.
- Jury trials in municipal appeals cases increased 300% (1 to 4).
- Drug court filings increased 3%.
- The percentage of felony cases with drug charges increased 39%, but only 3% of the filings were Drug Court.
- Defendants successfully completing the Drug Court Program increased 5%.

Comparing 2016 to 2012:.

- Traffic filings decreased 13%, and traffic dispositions decreased 15%.
- Municipal appeals filings decreased 48%.
- Jury trials in municipal appeals cases increased 33%, and bench trials increased by 167%.
- Drug Court filings increased 12%.
- The percentage of felony cases with drug charges increased 40%, but those diverted to Drug Court increased only 12%.
 - Drug Court graduation increased 6%.



The Drug Court Filings graph below shows the number of cases diverted to Drug Court from the total criminal filings with one or more felony drug charges. The second graph below shows Drug Felony Filings, filings with one or more drug-related charges, versus all Other Felony cases filed.



PROBATE RECORDS

2016 was a year of transition for the Probate Records Department.

The Probate Department successfully adapted to a significant turnover in staff, including a new director, a new supervisor, a new auditor, and three new clerks. In addition, the Probate Division/19 experienced significant turnover, as they welcomed a new Judge, a new Deputy Commissioner, and a new Judicial Administrative Assistant to their team.

In February, a new Public Administrator was appointed. Members of the Probate Department and Division 19 worked in collaboration to successfully process over 1000 cases in which the Public Administrator was the fiduciary. This was a multi-step process. Not all of the steps could be performed at the same time, so this project required multiple instances of case processing and case review. Steps involved in this process were: issuance of an order granting letters to the new Public Administrator, assignment of the new Public Administrator as a party to all of the cases in JIS, issuance of letters to the new Public Administrator, generation of orders to the former Public Administrator to file final settlement, calendaring cases to ensure final settlements were filed, and audit/review of final settlements.

Over the course of the year and using special assistance funding, scanning of pending cases continued. At the end of the year, approximately 1600 pending case files remained to be scanned.

Although there has been some decrease in new case filings, it is important to recognize that the pending caseload and ongoing administration of probate matters, between 7,000 and 8,000 cases, accounts for a significant portion of our workload, as these cases require several instances of case review each year.

The Probate Department received and processed 22,460 total eFiling submissions during 2016.

The Probate Department examined its case processing practices and determined that due to certain practices not all case filings were being captured in the case filings count. A new plan was developed, to go into place beginning on January 1, 2017, which will allow for an accurate case filing count to be obtained.


- Referrals on Abuse-Neglect were unchanged, but formal filings for Abuse-Neglect decreased 13%.
- Referrals for Delinquency decreased 21%, and formal filings on Delinquency decreased 34%.
- Felony Delinquency filings decreased 40%; misdemeanor filings decreased 54%.
- Formal filings for Termination of Parental Rights increased 149%.
- Youth placed in residential decreased 46%.
- Youth starting probation decreased 9%.
- Increases in Mediation 32%, Actual Visits/ Exchanges 21%, and Parent Awareness 2%.



CIVIL PROCESS

Civil Process attempts service at the addresses provided. If the deputy learns the address is "bad", they try to establish a "good " one by calling the attorney or checking with neighbors, for example. Bad addresses prevent proper service, and account for 18% (3,414 papers) of the overall total of 18,577. It is also the only variable for establishing service that is out of the control of Civil Process. If we look at service without the bad addresses subset the service rate is over 80%.

The department changed how evictions are handled in 2016, improving the efficacy of this process and simultaneously reducing deputy hours associated with evictions. This allowed deputies to devote more time and resources to serving orders of protection, reflected in the 39% increase of service in this area.




- The total number of all papers received decreased 4%.
- The total number of pre-judgment process received decreased 6%.
- The number of pre-judgment process served remained unchanged, but the service rate improved by 3%.
- The total number of post-judgment process received decreased 4%.
- The percentage of protective orders served increased 39%.
- Attachments/replevins increased 8%.
- The number of parcels offered and the number of parcels sold at the Delinquent Land Tax (DLT) Sale decreased 14% and 6%, respectively, however, the ratio of sold to offered parcels increased 5%.
- Gross revenue generated from the DLT sale increased 1%.

Comparing 2016 to 2012:

- The total number of all papers received decreased 32%.
- The total number of pre-judgment process received decreased 28%.
- The number of pre-judgment process served decreased 26%, but the service rate improved by 1%.
- The total number of post-judgment process received decreased 36%.
- The percentage of protective orders served increased 63%.
- Attachments/replevins increased 177%.
- The number of parcels offered at the DLT Sale decreased 34%, but the number of parcels sold increased 24%, and the ratio of sold to offered parcels increased 28%.
- Gross revenue generated from the DLT sale increased 24%.







JURY

2016 was the first full year in which the new jury room in the Eastern Jackson County Courthouse in Independence was in use. The jury room now accommodates 220 jurors, about twice the number of the old jury room.

Although Division 12 joined the other four jury trial divisions located in the Eastern Jackson County Courthouse in mid-2015, the increased need for jurors was not immediate. Division 12 initially had a docket comprised of fewer of the types of cases which are jury-tried, but in 2016 was assigned a docket that included the full range of cases heard by judges sitting in Independence hearing jury tried cases

As a result of the ability to accommodate more jurors and of the additional trial division in Independence, 500 summons to appear in Independence are now issued for jurors weekly. This in turn is reflected in both the 49% increase in available jurors in Independence in 2016 and the 67% increase in jurors sent on panels to the Independence divisions during 2016 as compared to the prior year, and the even more significant increases as compared to 2012.


- ♦ Jury trials increased 10%.
- Jury trials in criminal cases increased by 8% and, in civil cases, by 13%.
- 22% more people qualified for jury duty, an 11% increase in Kansas City and a 49% increase in Independence.*
- The number of jurors sent to divisions increased by 13%, with 67% more jurors being sent to Independence divisions.*
- The civil case types with the greatest percentage of jury trials were employment discrimination, personal injury, and contract cases. For criminal cases, homicide, assault, and burglary charges were filed in the cases with the most jury trials.
- Juror yield increased from 32% in 2015 to 35% in 2016.
- The percentage of qualified jurors sent for jury selection decreased 3%.


Comparing 2016 to 2012:

- Jury trials increased 13%.
- Jury trials in criminal cases increased by 52%; jury trials in civil cases decreased by10%.
- 35% more people qualified for jury duty at both courthouses, a 102% increase in Independence and a 14% increase in Kansas City.*
- The number of jurors sent to divisions increased 27%, with the number of jurors sent to Kansas City divisions increasing by 9% and to Independence divisions by 79%.*
- Juror yield increased from 31% to 35%.
- The percentage of qualified jurors sent for selection decreased from 46% in 2012 to 43% in 2016.

This is due in large part to an increase in the number of jurors summoned to the Independence location for jury service.

COURT INFORMATION TECHNOLOGY (CIT)

In 2016, CIT completed several network and application projects aimed at adding resiliency to Court's network infrastructure, enhancing systems and aligning CIT's technology services, priorities and researches with the business directions and needs of the Court.

New applications were developed, initiatives started and some existing applications were enhanced:

- A new application automatically texts a reminder of the next court date to defendants who are released from the Jackson County Detention Center while criminal cases against them proceed to disposition or through probation.
- After development and testing in 2015, the automatic transmission of arrest warrants to REJIS and of served/recalled warrants from REJIS, went live, replacing paper arrest warrants for all law enforcement agencies except the Missouri Highway Patrol and the Independence Police Department
- EPICOR, which is used by Human Resources, was extended to permit online applications for employment with the Court and to transmit these applications to the appropriate personnel.
- CIT developed a calendar system to track change controls. The objectives were to enhance communication, coordination and tracking of all changes in the Court's network and systems infrastructure.
- CIT initiated a cyber-security program to help promote a safer and more secure online experience for Court users. A week long campaign with a theme, "Think before you click" helped raised awareness to Court's user community.

CIT continued to maintain and improve the network infrastructure for the Court in its multiple locations. As part of that work,

- 287 workstations were replaced,
- 70 workstations were upgraded,
- 10 wireless access points were added giving us a total of 90 wireless access points,
- 87 switches, 11 routers and 7 firewalls were serviced and maintained
- 13 UPS units were added, and,
- 234 virtual machines were supported, 67 on desktops and 167 on servers.




